

Villager's nine-month web bid ends in success

A woman from a village in Shropshire is celebrating after a nine-month battle to secure a broadband link to her home from BT ended in success.

Emma Price, who lives in Marton close to the Shropshire/Mid Wales border, initially applied for broadband with BT in May last year but was told she could not have the service until either the nearest exchange was upgraded or until someone cancelled their subscription. But after Councillor

Heather Kidd, Shropshire member for Chirbury and Worthen, got in touch with BT group chief executive Ian Livingston, the issue was swiftly resolved.

Mr Livingston intervened to make sure Miss Price could get a broadband service which is now working. BT has already rolled out fibre-optic broadband to almost 100,000 homes across the county as part of a bid to improve the service in rural areas.

Councillor Kidd said: "I've been campaigning for a number of years to get both BT and the council to give the commitment to give us proper high speed broadband.

"Businesses and individuals, if anything, rely on the internet more in country areas than those in towns.

"I have people all over the Chirbury and Worthen division from Pentervin to Stiperstones and Brompton finding it difficult or impossible to receive broadband.

"I'd like to thank Mr Livingston for his intervention and the other BT staff who made this possible. It's amazing what becomes possible when the CEO gets involved.

"I understand that a commercial company will be offering an alternative high speed service for rural areas like ours from this month. I hope that this will give BT and other providers the jolt necessary to give us the same choice and accessibility that residents in local towns already enjoy."

Small woods project due to end this year

Heartwoods, a project of small woods based in Ironbridge, is scheduled to end in September.

Developed from the previous Marches Woodland Initiative and funded through the RDPE programme, it has been going since December 2009 and has brought benefits to the whole of the woodfuel supply chain including not just woodland owners but local forestry contractors employed throughout the counties of Shropshire, Herefordshire and Worcestershire, Staffordshire and Warwickshire.

Over the last three years, the programme has supported more than 1,000 rural businesses including 320 woodland advisory visits, 30 woodfuel boiler surveys, 70 capital grant applications for applicants securing over £500,000 in grant funding and leveraging investment of £1,250,000 in the industry.

It has also generated 128 consultancy referrals including woodland advisory visits for owners and timber inventory surveys. A total of 700 individuals have benefited from woodland management training and knowledge transfer events. In total, the woodland area brought back into management and bringing with it a range of environmental benefits now exceeds 4,000 hectares with a 5,000 hectare target by the summer of 2013, in a region where approximately 35 per cent (35,000 Ha.) of woodlands are unmanaged.

And it doesn't end there. As one of the six Woodfuel Champion consultants for Heartwoods, I've witnessed myself the way in which the multiplier effect has benefited local communities. A classic example is a farmer or woodland owner who doesn't know what to do with his 'unmanaged' woodland but knows timber prices are fairly buoyant right now yet doesn't have the time or expertise about how to enter the market.

He calls Heartwoods and one of the project officers arranges a site visit for impartial advice. Very often this could result in a referral to one of the Woodfuel Champions to undertake a timber inventory survey at a subsidised daily rate of £100 plus VAT.

There is an additional FC grant to write a plan under the current English Woodland Grant Scheme, which, once approved by the FC, can allow the owner to apply for a whole series of grants for other operations, including the Woodfuel Woodland Improvement Grant to cover timber sales, track building, and other WIGs for thinning and coppicing work to improve bird habitat.

I now have a number of schemes with all the grants in place that are now at the implementation stage, which involves thinning work, clearing rhododendron and employing local contractors, including two horse-loggers in the Clun valley at least for the next several months before other projects come on stream.

Organisers double donations after tree moved to new location

Tree of Light event to be record breaker

A Tree of Light campaign in Oswestry is expected to be a record breaker this year thanks to thousands of pounds in donations.

Oswestry Rotary Club's Tree of Light has been stood outside St Oswald's Church, in Church Street, for about 14 years to raise money for local good causes. But this year it was moved to the entrance of Sainsbury's store because organisers felt it would make 'more of an impact'.

Today organisers revealed they are expecting to raise more than £4,000 from donations, almost double last year's total of £2,317.50.

The campaign started on December 1 and ever since people have been asked to pay a minimum donation of £5 to have a name, memory of a loved one, cause or event put on the tree.

Calculations so far by the Rotary club have shown the total cash donations this year is expected to beat last year's figure.

Rotarian Mike Jones, event organiser, said: "The new location at Sainsbury's has worked really well and I would like to thank everybody there for all their help and support - it has been a great team effort between the store and the club.

"But the biggest thanks go to the people of Oswestry and the surrounding area for their generosity. Our featured charities are all very deserving and despite difficult times, the local community has come up trumps."

Charities which will benefit from this year's campaign include Hope House Children's Hospice, The County Air Ambulance Trust, The Cricket Federation for People with Disabilities, North Shropshire Special Olympics and Rotary good causes.

In December Rotarians celebrated the launch of the Tree of Light by inviting John Abram the High Sheriff of Shropshire to take part in the switch-on.
